# CILLIAN MURPHY

Cillian was born on 25th May 1976, in Douglas, Cork. His mother was a French teacher while his father worked in the Department of Education. He was raised in Ballintemple. He began writing songs at the age of 10. He attended St Anthony's for primary school and Presentation Brothers College for Secondary School, where he did well academically.

Cillian got his first taste of performing in the Pres when he participated in a drama module presented by director Pat Kiernan. He later described this experience as a 'huge high' and a 'fully alive' feeling that he then set out to chase.

In his late teens, he was in a band with his brother Paidí. He studied law at UCC but failed his first-year exams because he wasn't truly passionate about the subject and was busy with his band. His first major acting role was in the UCC Drama Society's amateur production of 'Observe the Sons of Ulster Marching Towards the Somme'.

In September 1996, Cillian made his professional acting debut on the stage, playing the part of a volatile Cork teenager in 'Disco Pigs'. He starred in many other theatre productions after that and subsequently began appearing in short films. He relocated to Dublin and then to London in 2001.

Cillian appeared in mainstream movies such as Christopher Nolan's 'Batman Begins' and Wes Craven's 'Red Eye' both in 2005. *The New York Times* film critic Manohola Dargis asserted that Cillian made a 'pictureperfect villain'. He received several award nominations for his 2005 villainous roles, almond them a nomination as Best Villian at the 2006 MTV Awards for 'Batman Begins'.

In 2023 Cilian portrayed Robert Oppenheimer in the hit movie 'Oppenheimer. For his performance he won the Golden Globe Award for Best Actor in a Leading Role, Screen Actor's Guild Award for Outstanding Performance by a Male Actor in a Leading Role, and Academy Award for Best Actor.

After winning his Oscar, was Murphy celebrated across Ireland, but especially in Cork. RTÉ visited us here in St Anthony's and The Presentation Brothers interviewing several students and staff. Cillian is a huge inspiration for millions of children and actors across the world and we wish him huge success in the future.

### MEETING SHEKU KANNEH MASON

On January 19th my Mum, Granny and I went to the National Concert Hall in Dublin to watch Sheku Kanneh Mason perform with the National Symphony Orchestra.

### Sheku Kanneh Mason

Sheku Kanneh Mason is already a world-renowned cellist at just 24! At just 9 years old he passed Grade 8 with the highest marks in Britain. In 2016 he won the BBC young musician of the year and was the first black musician to win this coveted award. He has also featured at the renowned BBC Proms every summer since. In 2018 he played at the wedding of Prince Harry and Meghan Markle. The cello he plays is a Matteo Gofriller from 1700 which is worth almost 6 million euro!



### The Concert

Sheku played Edward Elgar's Cello Concerto in E Minor which Elgar wrote to express his feelings on the Great War. It is a complex and thoughtful concerto and Sheku played it with great feeling and skill.

He then played a piece which he had composed himself. I think I held my breath for most of his performance; awed by his storytelling through his cello. He received a long-standing ovation.

I have been playing cello for 7 years and have followed Sheku's success with awe. As the 19th drew near, I was so excited to get to hear him play. Unbeknownst to me, my mum got in touch with his agent to ask if I could go backstage to meet with Sheku. Together with the staff at the National Concert Hall, they arranged for a special one-to-one meeting for me!

At the interval, I was escorted backstage. My heart was thumping in my chest. Sheku appeared and greeted me warmly. He was extremely nice and exuded a gentle confidence. I asked him when he started playing if he liked composing and complimented him on his performance. He said he started playing at the age of 6 and enjoyed composing. He asked about my cello experience and said he remembered going to his local concert hall as a child to sit in the front row and watch the performances. To think of him now touring the world is amazing. It was a fantastic experience to meet such a brilliant and inspiring man.
